

Pharmacist-Initiated Dispensing of Opioid Antagonists

Under 201 KAR 2:360, pharmacists can initiate the dispensing of opioid antagonists pursuant to a physician-approved protocol.

Step 1: Get Opioid Antagonist Certified

- Each pharmacist dispensing opioid antagonists per protocol must be certified.
- Print and complete the Board of Pharmacy's Application for Pharmacist Certification For Opioid Antagonist Dispensing: pharmacy.ky.gov/professionals/Pages/Pharmacists.aspx.
- Submit the application to the Board of Pharmacy via mail, email or fax.
- You will be issued a new pharmacist license that includes "Opioid Antagonist Certified."

Step 2: Establish Workflow and Documentation

- Assess and revise your current workflow to meet the education and documentation requirements of the law.
- Develop or obtain written educational materials that you will use for patient counseling.

Step 3: Establish a Protocol with a Physician

- A physician-approved protocol authorizes the pharmacist to initiate the dispensing of opioid antagonists.
- Each pharmacist who will dispense opioid antagonists must be listed, but a single physician can authorize multiple pharmacists.

Proof of training is not required to become opioid antagonist certified. However, training is recommended for pharmacists unfamiliar with protocol dispensing or overdose response. Free continuing education is available: healky.learningexpressce.com.
